12. Describe the nature and extent of your experience as a practicing attorney in the trial and appellate courts, and explain how such experience demonstrates the quality of your legal work.

I began my career with the Missouri Department of Revenue where I represented the State of Missouri in U.S. Bankruptcy Court and handled a docket of 40-50 corporate tax cases. This role was my first experience in the courtroom and led to my interest in a career as a trial attorney.

I moved to the Jackson County Prosecutor's office where I have had the privilege of gaining extensive trial experience while also developing thoughtful and decisive decision-making skills and honing my communication skills with both lawyers and the general public. I began my career in the Prosecutor's office in the Community Justice Unit where I was the primary contact within the Prosecutor's office for numerous law enforcement agencies and neighborhood associations and was responsible for coordinating the prosecution of chronic offenders. I was responsible for a caseload of 20-30 felony cases and tried jury trials as both first and second chair. In this position I began developing my trial skills but also developed my understanding of the varied role of a prosecutor. In my conversations with community members, I began to see the role of a prosecutor and a judge through the eyes of non-lawyers and saw the direct impact of the legal process on the community as a whole.

After working in both Eastern Jackson County and the Kansas City urban core as a community prosecutor, I transferred to the Major Crimes Unit where I maintained a docket of approximately 30 cases involving A and B felonies and handled trials involving homicides, robberies, assaults and other major crimes. In addition to trial work, I was placed on the rotation for the homicide pager. In this rotation, I was on call 24-hours a day for two months out of the year and was the primary contact for all law enforcement agencies in Jackson County conducting homicide investigations. I routinely answered questions of detectives and made thoughtful but quick charging decisions. I also made hundreds of decisions regarding plea offers, with the goal of obtaining justice based upon the facts of the case and circumstances of the defendant and the victim.

In 2011, I was promoted to a Trial Team Leader of the Drug Unit. As a supervisor, I continued to maintain a docket of approximately 50 cases, served as lead counsel in approximately 2-4 jury trials a year and remained on the homicide pager rotation, but also supervised a team of five trial attorneys, a paralegal and two investigators. As a Trial Team Leader, I developed management skills and sharpened my communication skills with co-workers. I also continued to develop my litigation skills on complex matters such as forensic sciences, including DNA, fingerprint analysis, ballistics, psychiatry and pathology.

In early 2013, I was promoted to the position of Chief Trial Assistant, a position that reports directly to the elected Prosecutor. I currently supervise a team of 12 trial attorneys in the violent crimes and special victims units and manage support staff, investigators and victim advocates. I also maintain a docket of approximately 20 cases and serve as lead counsel in 2-4 jury trials a year. I play a significant role in Kansas City's No Violence Alliance, a new collaboration between federal, state and local law enforcement, the faith-based community, social service agencies and city leaders. The goal is to both reduce violent crime in Kansas City and provide social services to those offenders who want to choose a different path.

During my eleven years as a trial attorney, I have tried 23 cases as a first chair and approximately 15 additional cases as a second chair. My experiences as a trial attorney have not only taught me trial procedure and evidence but also have taught me how to be fair and impartial. I have learned how to make informed yet expeditious decisions and how to effectively communicate in a wide variety of situations. Most importantly, my experiences as a trial attorney have taught me the important role a judge plays in our legal system and in our community.

Mr. Cannon was charged with murder in the second degree and armed criminal action. After a jury trial, the defendant was convicted as charged and sentenced to 17 years. Mr. Cannon appealed and the conviction was upheld.

***State v. Terry Young*, 16CR01003337-01**

Date: June 6, 2005

Jurisdiction: Jackson County Circuit Court, Judge Charles Curless (visiting judge)

Represented: State of Missouri

Mr. Young was charged with murder in the first degree and armed criminal action. The eyewitnesses to the homicide were uncooperative at the time of trial. The jury convicted Mr. Young of both counts and he was sentenced to two life sentences.

State v. Terrance Robinson, 0816-CR01017-01

Date: December 15, 2008

Jurisdiction: Jackson County Circuit Court, Judge Jay Daugherty

Represented: State of Missouri

Mr. Robinson was charged with four counts of murder in the first degree and four counts of armed criminal action. There was evidence that while Mr. Robinson was incarcerated pending trial, he attempted to hire an individual to kill one of the eyewitnesses. Mr. Robinson was convicted as charged and sentenced to life without the possibility of parole.

State of Missouri v. Taqwa Thompson, 0816-CR0192-01

Jurisdiction: Jackson County Circuit Court, Judge David Byrn

Represented: State of Missouri

Mr. Thompson was charged with murder in the second degree and armed criminal action. The jury convicted Mr. Thompson of both counts and he was sentenced to 20 years.

State v. Deonta Taylor, 0916-CR00788-01

Date: June 1, 2010

Jurisdiction: Jackson County Circuit Court, Judge Sandra Midkiff

Represented: State of Missouri

Mr. Taylor was charged with two counts of murder in the first degree and two counts of armed criminal action. The State's evidence included multiple eyewitnesses as well as forensic evidence. After a jury trial, Mr. Taylor was convicted. He was sentenced to two life sentences without the possibility of parole.

State v. Carl Counce, 0916-CR04898-01

Date: July 21, 2010

Jurisdiction: Jackson County Circuit Court, Judge Jay Daugherty

Represented: State of Missouri

Mr. Counce was charged with assault of a law enforcement officer and armed criminal action. This case involved an officer conducting a pedestrian check of Mr. Counce who fled. During the pursuit, the State alleged Mr. Counce fired a handgun at the officer. After a bench trial, Mr. Counce was found guilty. He was

sentenced to 5 years.

State v. Blanche Johnson, 0916-CR05594-01

Date: August 16, 2010

Jurisdiction: Jackson County Circuit Court, Judge Brian Wimes

Represented: State of Missouri

Ms. Johnson was charged with murder in the second degree and armed criminal action. The State alleged Ms. Johnson shot and killed an individual with whom she previously had a relationship. In a videotaped statement to police, Ms. Johnson admitted to the homicide. However at the time of trial, she denied involvement. She was convicted by a jury and sentenced to 22 years.

State v. Travis Knott, 0916-CR05826-01

Date: February 8, 2010

Jurisdiction: Jackson County Circuit Court, Judge Joel Fahnestock

Represented: State of Missouri

Mr. Knott was charged with murder in the second degree, robbery in the first degree and two counts of armed criminal action. The State alleged Mr. Knott committed a robbery of a convenience store and while in flight from such robbery, an owner of the store was shot and killed. After a bench trial, Mr. Knott was found guilty. He received a sentence of 18 years.

State v. Deanthony Griddine, 1216-CR01683-01

Date: November 16, 2012

Jurisdiction: Jackson County Circuit Court, Judge John Torrence

Represented: State of Missouri

Mr. Griddine was charged with unlawful use of a weapon and armed criminal action. The State alleged Mr. Griddine had repeatedly fired a handgun at an occupied vehicle. A jury convicted Mr. Griddine and he was sentenced to 15 years.

State v. Dequan Hawkins, 1216-CR01455-01

Date: April 15, 2013

Jurisdiction: Jackson County Circuit Court, Judge David Byrn

Represented: State of Missouri

Mr. Hawkins was charged with murder in the second degree and armed criminal action. The State alleged that Mr. Hawkins shot and killed a 16-year-old girl outside of a convenience store. A jury convicted Mr. Hawkins as charged. Mr. Hawkins was sentenced to 30 years as to murder in the second degree and 20 years as to the armed criminal action charge, both sentences to run consecutively.

From the farmer who needed estate planning, to the local factory worker with a worker's compensation claim, to the single mother who needed to modify her child support, all walks of life came through the firm's doors. Although their legal needs were different, all had one goal: use the legal system to seek justice.

Working in the Jackson County Courthouse for the past 12 years, I have seen a similar phenomenon. Day after day, people from all over the metropolitan area come to the courthouse with a variety of problems. I have encountered litigants and witnesses in the elevators, hallways and courtrooms and seen the trepidation and sometimes fear they have interacting with the legal system. I have witnessed first-hand how the Jackson County judges address individuals with patience, thoughtfulness and kindness. And, if given the privilege of becoming a Jackson County judge, I will strive to do the same. Everyone who walks through the doors of the courthouse deserves to be treated fairly, equally and respectfully.


