12. Describe the nature and extent of your experience as a practicing attorney in the trial and appellate courts, and explain how such experience demonstrates the quality of your legal work.

I have had the honor and privilege to work at one law firm during my entire 25 year law career (including clerkship). Throughout my tenure at the Firm, I have worked with highly skilled and highly regarded lawyers. Since 1991, J.R. Hobbs has been my mentor, friend, and now law partner. J.R. Hobbs is regarded as one of the most skilled and respected trial attorneys in the state, if not the region. Together, we have had the opportunity to represent individuals and entities in some of the most emotionally charged, legally complex cases. J.R. Hobbs has greatly influenced the way I practice law. I also have been privileged to work closely with my law partners Jim Wyrsh, Steve Mirakian, as well as former law partners Charlie Atwell (prior to his appointment to the Jackson County Circuit Court bench) and Jackie Cook (prior to her election to the Cass/Johnson County Circuit Court bench), all of whom have taught me valuable lessons regarding the practice of law. The training and experience I have gained through my association with these talented lawyers has, in turn, earned me the respect of many well-seasoned attorneys throughout the state.

Throughout my career, I have practiced in city, state and federal court in Missouri and Kansas. I have also been admitted *pro hac vice* in federal court in Nevada, Iowa and South Carolina. My practice has been focused in the area of criminal defense, but I have also been involved in complex civil litigation matters including antitrust litigation,

Merchandising Practices Act violations, and *qui tam* actions. In the answer to Question #13 below, I have provided a list of ten cases representative of my caseload. Currently, my practice includes cases that proceed to trial, and those that are prepared for trial but are concluded by a guilty plea or other resolution. In many instances, the trial preparation includes taking depositions, preparing pretrial motions and conducting motion hearings. In those cases resulting in a guilty plea, there are instances where the sentencing hearing is a contested proceeding requiring significant preparation, research and sentencing memoranda. Finally, it would be difficult to count the number of number of matters that have been resolved without any charges being filed against my clients because of effective pre-indictment advocacy.

In Re Aluminum Phosphide Antitrust Litigation, Case No. 93-2452-KHV, in the United States District Court for the District of Kansas, Hon. Kathryn Vraitl presiding. JR Hobbs and I were co-counsel and represented defendant McShares, Inc., in this complex anti-trust suit alleging a conspiracy to fix the price of aluminum phosphide pellets and tablets in the United States. Pre-trial, I was heavily involved in drafting the *Daubert* motion to exclude testimony from plaintiffs' economic expert regarding the fact and amount of damages caused by defendants' alleged conspiracy. On July 5, 1995, after evidentiary hearing, Judge Vraitl sustained the *Daubert* motion and excluded the testimony of plaintiffs' economic expert. The matter proceeded to jury trial and the jury returned a defense verdict.

State of Kansas v. Bala Krovvidi, Case No. 00CR2903 in the District Court of Johnson County, Kansas, Hon. John Anderson presiding. Steve Mirakian and I represented the defendant Bala Krovvidi who was charged on or about July 26, 2001 with vehicular homicide, a class A person misdemeanor. The defense was based on a legal dispute as to whether a mere traffic infraction (running a red light) without more can be deemed a material violation from the standard of care necessary to support a conviction of vehicular homicide. There was significant post-trial briefing on this question of law. Judge Anderson entered a conviction after bench trial. On December 6, 2002, on appeal, the Kansas Supreme Court reversed, deciding the legal question in favor of the defendant.

State of Missouri v. Michael R. Coots, Case No. CR01-05535 in the Circuit Court of Jackson County, Missouri, Hon. Vernon Scoville presiding. Steve Mirakian and I represented the defendant Michael Coots who was charged with murder in the second degree, a class A felony, and assault in the second degree, a class C felony (alcohol related traffic fatality). The defense was based on a factual dispute as to whether Mr. Coots was the driver of the vehicle. The first jury trial resulted in a hung jury. On or about August 22, 2003, after retrial, the jury found the defendant not guilty.

Lance Scott v. Blue Springs Ford, Inc., et al., Case No. 01CV200143 in the Circuit Court of Jackson County, Hon. Marco Roldan presiding. JR Hobbs and I represented individual defendant Bob Balderston in a civil matter alleging violations of the Consumer Protection Act, fraud, and Merchandising Practices Act. The jury returned a defense verdict for Bob Balderston individually. The jury awarded plaintiff a \$840,000 verdict against co-defendant Blue Springs Ford represented separately by Larry Tyrl and Bill Carr. On November 21, 2006, on appeal, the defense verdict in favor of Bob Balderston was upheld.

State of Missouri v. Mark R. Holdcraft, Case No 0916-CR06429 in the Circuit Court of Jackson County, Hon. Sandra Midkiff presiding. I represented the defendant Mark Holdcraft who was charged on or about January 8, 2010, by indictment with three counts of statutory sodomy in the first degree, one count of child molestation in the first degree, and one count of child enticement. The defense was a general denial. After conducting numerous depositions for the defense, the State agreed to dismiss Counts 1-5, and defendant entered a guilty plea to sexual misconduct involving a child under the age of 15, a class D felony. On October 6, 2010, the defendant was sentenced to four years, suspended execution of sentence, five years probation.

Joshua K. Bruns v. Director of Revenue, Case No. 11JO-CV00292 in the Associate Circuit Court of Johnson County, Missouri, Hon. W. Sue Dodson presiding. I represented the petitioner Joshua Bruns on his Petition for Review challenging the suspension of his driver's license for refusal to submit to a breath test. The challenge was based on an assertion that the petitioner was not under arrest at the time of the alleged refusal. On or about May 5, 2011, after evidentiary hearing, Judge Dodson agreed and entered judgment in favor of petitioner.

United States ex rel. Ammons v. The Pasha Group, et al., Case No. 1:07cv1198 in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia, Hon. Anthony J. Trenga presiding. James Wyrsh was the lead attorney in this *qui tam* action alleging violations of the False Claims Act. I took the lead in drafting the *Daubert* motion to exclude expert testimony of two government experts regarding complex damages calculations. On July 5, 2011, based on the pleadings and without necessity of a hearing, the court completely excluded the testimony of one government expert, and substantially limited the testimony of the second government expert.

State of Kansas v. Ann Muraya, Case No 12CR747 in the District Court of Johnson County, Kansas, Hon. Stephen Tatum presiding. I represented the defendant who was charged with one count of making a false statement on a Department of Homeland Security I-9 form. I filed a motion to dismiss for lack of jurisdiction on the grounds that the case was preempted by federal statute. On August 29, 2012, Judge Tatum entered an Order of Dismissal submitted by the assistant district attorney handling the case. The defendant was not subsequently charged in federal court.

State of Missouri v. Robert W. Finn, Case No. 1116-CR04467, in the Circuit Court of Jackson County, Missouri, Hon. John Torrance presiding. J.R. Hobbs, Gerald Handley and I represented the defendant Robert Finn who was charged with two misdemeanors for failure of a mandated reporter to report. I was involved in all aspects of this case, and was responsible for drafting the pretrial motions raising constitutional challenges to the statute as written and as applied, as well as other pretrial motions. In September 2012, this matter was resolved prior to trial by a guilty plea.

United States v. Carole Colson, Case No. 10-00331-02-CR-W-DGK, in the United States District Court for the Western District of Missouri, Hon. Greg Kays presiding. I represented the defendant who was charged with conspiracy to commit wire fraud and thirty-three other substantive counts based on a mortgage fraud scheme. The defendant entered a guilty plea and agreed to cooperate with the government in the investigation and prosecution of her five co-defendants. The government requested a sentence of one year plus one day imprisonment. Judge Kays considered my sentencing memorandum including legal authorities and factual information regarding the defendant's medical condition, as well as the appropriate sentencing factors highlighted at the sentencing hearing. On May 12, 2014, the defendant was granted five years probation.

United States v. Beverly Susan Rene Smith, Case No. 4:14CR00091-1 in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Missouri, Hon. Rodney W. Sippel presiding. I represented the defendant who was charged with wire fraud based on embezzlement of about \$175,000 from her employer between 2006 and June 2012. The defendant entered a guilty plea and requested a sentence of probation. The government requested a sentence of one year plus one day imprisonment. Judge Sippel considered my sentencing memorandum including legal authorities cited regarding diminished capacity due to a spending disorder, as well as the appropriate sentencing factors highlighted at the sentencing hearing. On August 27, 2014, the defendant was granted five years probation.

United States v. John J. Hilliard, Case No. 93-1282 in the United States Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit. I was on the brief, and the case argued by JR Hobbs. In the case below, JR Hobbs and I represented defendant John Hilliard at jury trial in the United States District Court of Colorado. After jury trial, the defendant was convicted of bank fraud and related counts. JR Hobbs and I then represented defendant on appeal. Defendant appealed, arguing that the trial court erred in giving a deliberate ignorance instruction. On August 3, 1994, on appeal, the Tenth Circuit agreed and reversed. This case is cited as a seminal case on the use of the deliberate ignorance instruction in a criminal case.

J.S. v. Beaird, Case No. SC488274 in the Supreme Court of Missouri on appeal from the Circuit Court of Jackson County, Missouri, Hon. Jon R. Gray. I was on the brief, and case was argued by Jim Wyrsh. I was asked to take the lead on drafting the declaratory judgment briefs in the Circuit Court and then on appeal to the Missouri Supreme Court. We challenged the applicability of the sex offender registration statute to J.S. We raised both factual and constitutional challenges to the statute regarding the improper retrospective application of the statute. On October 17, 2000, the Supreme Court ruled in J.S.'s favor on the factual issue and did not reach the constitutional issues.

United States v. Suzanne Keisling, Case No. 04-2947 in the United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit. I represented the defendant at trial and on appeal. I was on the brief and argued the case on appeal. The defendant was convicted after trial of bank fraud. On appeal, the issue presented was whether the trial court committed constitutional error at sentencing based on the application of the federal sentencing guidelines when the facts relied upon to determine the guideline range were not alleged in the indictment, admitted by the defendant or found by the jury. The issue was identified prior to the seminal *Booker* decision. In June, 2005, the Eighth Circuit denied relief, affirmed the conviction and upheld the sentence.

United States v. Jan Helder, Case No. 05-3387 in the United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit. JR Hobbs and I represented the defendant at trial and on appeal. I was on the appellate brief, and the case was argued by JR Hobbs. The Government appealed an order from the United States District Court for the Western District of Missouri, Hon. Dean Whipple, acquitting the defendant of jury conviction for attempt to entice a minor to engage in illegal sexual activity. This was a question of first impression in the Eight Circuit. On August 6, 2006, on appeal and contrary to the defendant's position and the findings of Judge Whipple, the Eighth Circuit reversed, holding that the crime of attempting to entice a minor to engage in illegal sexual activity does not require that the intended victim be an actual minor.

I have described the scope of my litigation experience above. In addition to the management of an active caseload, I have also had the responsibility of managing much of the day to day operations at the Firm. My accounting background allows me to deal with these matters in a thorough and methodical fashion. These tasks range from review and signing checks, review and approval of monthly financial statements, and firm operational contracts (i.e., lease, health insurance, Westlaw/Lexis contracts, copiers, computers, etc.). I have also managed personnel issues involving support staff, clerks and lawyers. I am also involved in the year-end Firm compensation committee, and heavily involved in the preparation of detailed year-end spreadsheets for compensation and tax purposes.

My law partners and associates often turn to me for guidance on legal questions and strategy. It is not uncommon for me to be consulted at least one time per day to discuss a matter not directly related to a case I am working on, or to deal with a firm administrative matter. As a result, I have become skilled in the art of multitasking and prioritizing. At the end of the day, I enjoy the practice of law and the related management issues.

In addition to high legal acumen, I believe a Circuit Court Judge should be skilled in efficiently managing a high volume Civil and/or Criminal docket. I believe a strong administrative background is part of being a good Circuit Court Judge. My skill set lends itself to being an efficient and effective manager. Additionally, due to the breadth of my law practice, I have had the opportunity to come in contact with clients and lawyers with varying backgrounds and experience. Over the years, I have been successful due, in part, to my ability to effectively communicate with a diverse group of people.
