Johnson & Johnson appeals the trial court's judgment after a jury verdict in favor of the estate of Jacqueline Fox in this product liability suit. Pursuant to Rule 52.05, Ms. Fox and 62 other non-residents joined an action by two Missouri plaintiffs claiming that J&J marketed and sold talcum powder knowing that the product increased consumers' risk of ovarian cancer. J&J moved to dismiss the claims of the non-residents for lack of personal jurisdiction. The trial court denied the motion, reasoning that each non-resident need not establish an individual basis for jurisdiction so long as a defendant has sufficient minimum contacts with the state.

REVERSED AND VACATED

<u>DIVISION THREE HOLDS</u>: The United States Supreme Court's recent decision in *Bristol-Myers Squibb Co. v. Superior Court of California*, 137 S.Ct. 1773 (2017), is controlling. Specific jurisdiction requires a connection between the forum state and the specific claims at issue. Absent such a connection, specific jurisdiction is lacking regardless of the defendant's unconnected activities in the state or the similarity of the resident plaintiffs' injuries.
