Public Computer Use Policy

Computer Use:

- The Library's computer work stations are intended for legal research, and are available on a first-come, first-served basis.
- The Library reserves the right to restrict users to 30 minute sessions.
- Public workstations cannot guarantee user privacy.
- Court staff may suggest useful websites, but cannot provide in-depth computer or website training.
- Printing is available for \$.10 per page.

Restrictions:

The Library's computer workstations shall not be used:

- For any purpose that violates applicable U.S., state, or local laws and regulations.
- For downloading or printing and otherwise obtaining information in a manner that violates applicable copyright laws and licensing agreements.
- For downloading software, executable files, databases, and similar "live" technology to the workstation or network disk drives.
- In a manner that destroys or damages equipment, software, network functions, or data belonging to the Library.
- In a manner that disrupts or interferes with Library network services. This includes, but is not limited to: propagation of computer viruses, worms, and similar programs; excessive use of connect time or printing resources; attempts to add, modify, or remove Library system software or other system elements; attempts to evade system security measures or network access rights; distribution of spam, advertising, or unsolicited e-mail; harassment, libeling, or slandering of others.
- In a manner that disrupts or interferes with other Library computer users. This includes, but is not limited to: harassment of others through the display of print text or graphics that may reasonably be construed as offensive.

Violations:

- Users violating these guidelines may suffer penalties ranging from a warning to the permanent revocation of the violator's access to the Library's networking services, as deemed appropriate by the Court staff.
