12. Describe the nature and extent of your experience as a practicing attorney in the trial and appellate courts, and explain how such experience demonstrates the quality of your legal work.

I have spent every day of my professional career working on behalf of the citizens of Missouri. Over a decade ago, I began working as a judicial law clerk for Judge Lisa White Hardwick of the Missouri Court of Appeals. As an appellate law clerk, I reviewed the decisions and determinations of trial court judges throughout the Western District of Missouri. For three years, I was exposed to a broad array of procedural and substantive legal issues involving civil, criminal, domestic, juvenile and administrative appeals. The issues raised in these appeals often involved workers compensation disputes, personal injury claims, employment discrimination allegations, dissolutions of marriage, child custody, termination of parental rights, as well as a host of criminal matters and determinations by the Missouri Public Service Commission. Each case presented novel and complex questions of law, and I was responsible for conducting exhaustive research on all arguments raised by the parties and the Appellate Court. Using this research and established standard of review, I analyzed the entire record on appeal, which included all relevant motions filed in the original case, all applicable court orders and voluminous transcripts. I then collaborated with Judge Hardwick and drafted preliminary judicial opinions affirming or reversing rulings of the trial court judge or hearing officer.

My work as a law clerk made me comfortable addressing unique and unfamiliar areas of law. While working at the Court of Appeals I developed the ability to conduct efficient and thorough research, and write concise opinions resolving complex legal questions. I also gained an appreciation for the vital importance of always creating a record for appellate review.

When I left the Court of Appeals, I became a trial attorney with the Jackson County, Missouri Prosecutor's Office. As an Assistant Prosecuting Attorney, I gained considerable trial experience early in my career. As a an Assistant Prosecuting Attorney I tried over 20 criminal cases, the majority of them to a jury, and represented the Missouri Department of Revenue in over 30 civil administrative bench trials. On a daily basis, I appeared in Jackson County Circuit Court for substantive evidentiary hearings on motions for bond modification, suppression of evidence, probation violations and sentencing recommendations. Initially, I was assigned to the high-volume drug unit for almost two years before requesting to be transferred to the victim-intense domestic violence unit. In the domestic violence unit I had the ability to remain a trial attorney while positively impacting the quality of life for victims of violent crime.

In addition to maintaining a full criminal trial docket, I served as the primary appellate attorney for the Prosecutor's Office. I filed extraordinary writs for relief and appellate briefs with the Missouri Court of Appeals, as well as responded to an emergency writ with the Missouri Supreme Court. I had the honor

of returning to the Missouri Court of Appeals, Western District to argue an appellate brief I had written on the State's liability to pay attorney's fees for a defendant who was acquitted of a murder charge. I also was consistently asked to review complicated legal issues and provide guidance to senior attorneys in various criminal cases including capital cases.

In 2010, I was given the opportunity to serve as the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) Special Assistant United States Attorney in the United States Attorney's Office. As the HIDTA Special Assistant I practiced exclusively in both the Federal District Court for the Western District of Missouri and the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals. For three years I was assigned to the narcotic and gang unit and participated in complex criminal investigations involving multi-defendant drug conspiracies, money laundering through multi-national banks and wire fraud. I also focused on investigating and prosecuting violent crimes committed in Kansas City and St. Joseph, Missouri. The federal model of vertical prosecution permitted me to be involved in pre-arrest investigations, Grand Jury presentations of proposed Indictments, arrests, arraignments, pre-trial motions, trials, appeals and requests for post-conviction relief. As a federal prosecutor I tried four federal jury trials and wrote three appellate briefs to the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals.

Recently, I was elevated to the position of Chief Trial Attorney with the Jackson County, Missouri Prosecutor's Office, while maintaining my designation as a Special Assistant United States Attorney. I currently supervise over 20 criminal prosecutors and support staff. As a Chief I have the opportunity to train new attorneys, and take on a management role within the Prosecutor's Office. My cross designation as a Chief Trial Attorney and a Special Assistant United States Attorney permits me to conduct criminal trials in both state and federal court.

As a state and federal prosecutor I have the responsibility of making very difficult decisions that affect the lives of others and the safety of the general public. Rarely are these decisions easy, clear-cut, or popular. A determination to file charges, or proceed to trial, is never taken lightly and must only be done after a complete review of the facts and available evidence.

Over the last eleven years my legal practice has been varied and extensive. I have tried over 20 criminal and 30 civil administrative cases in state court. I have also written appellate briefs and argued before the Missouri Court of Appeals. I have tried four complex jury trials in the Federal District Court and have written appellate briefs to the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals. I have worked hard at every opportunity that I have been given and have strived to be a conscientious attorney that advances clear, concise and well-reasoned arguments. In 2009, I was humbled by my peers honoring me as the Louis Lombardo Prosecutor of the Year. The increasing level of responsibility that I have been given throughout my career, as well as garnering the respect of my peers, demonstrates the quality of my legal work and expertise.

April 29, 2013. Defendant was convicted of Possession of a Controlled Substance with the Intent to Distribute after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of being in possession of two pounds of powder cocaine at the Greyhound Bus Station in Kansas City, Missouri.

United States of America v. Jason L. Robbins, 11-00082-01-CR-W-DGK, United States Courts for the Western District of Missouri, Judge Greg Kays. Represented the United States of America, First Chair. November 26, 2012. Defendant was convicted of two counts of being a Felon in Possession of a Firearm and two counts of being in Possession of a Stolen Firearm after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of being a convicted felon and participating in the theft of multiple firearms, he placed one of the stolen firearms in his girlfriend's mouth during a dispute.

United States of America v. Rasheed Shakur, et al., 09-00224-01/08-CR-W-HFS, United States Courts for the Western District of Missouri, Judge Greg Kays. Represented the United States of America, Second Chair. February 4, 2011. Lead Defendant was convicted of Conspiracy to Distribute a Controlled Substance, Conspiracy to Commit Money Laundering, two counts of Possession of a Controlled Substance with Intent of Distribute, being a Felon in Possession of a Firearm and Possession of a Firearm in a Drug Trafficking Offense after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of being the organizer of a drug trafficking ring involving over 20 co-conspirators/defendants. Key witnesses for the United States during this three-week trial included over 10 co-conspirators/defendants.

United States of America v. Jason L. Harris, 10-06006-01-CR-W-DGK, United States Courts for the Western District of Missouri, Judge Greg Kays. Represented the United States of America, First Chair. November 2, 2010. Defendant was convicted of two counts of being a Felon in Possession of a Firearm after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of being a convicted felon and firing a firearm during a dispute.

State of Missouri v. Melba J. Walker, 0916-CR01109, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 8, Judge Peggy Stevens McGraw. Represented the State of Missouri, First chair. August 9, 2010. Defendant was found not guilty of Murder in the Second Degree and Armed Criminal Action after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of shooting a woman she had been associated with. Key witnesses for the state included the defendant's son and daughter-in-law.

State of Missouri v. Marion Chapman, 0816-CR04775, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 10, Judge Charles Atwell. Represented the State of Missouri, Second Chair. April 29, 2010. Defendant was convicted of Murder in the Second Degree and Armed Criminal Action after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of stabbing and killing his paramour. Key witnesses for the State included the defendant's mother and sisters.

State of Missouri v. Dustin P. Hency, 0816-CR06624, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 1, Judge Sandra Midkiff. Represented the State of Missouri, First Chair. November 18, 2009. A hung jury after 8 days of trial. Defendant pled guilty before the next trial setting. Defendant was accused of killing a teenage boy after a fight. Key witnesses for the State included teenage friends of the defendant.

State of Missouri v. Carrie A. Washington, 0816-CR04058, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 15, Judge Robert Schieber. Represented the State of Missouri, Second Chair. July 20, 2009. Defendant was convicted of Voluntary Manslaughter and Armed Criminal Action after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of stabbing and killing her boyfriend.

State of Missouri v. Leonard I. Jackson, 0816-CR01197, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 70, Judge John Moran. Represented the State of Missouri, Second Chair. March 4, 2009. Defendant was convicted of Domestic Assault in the Second Degree, Attempted Robbery in the Second Degree and Misdemeanor False Imprisonment after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of assaulting his girlfriend, binding her with duct tape and robbing her.

State of Missouri v. Joseph L. Emory, 0716-CR03404, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 3, Judge David Byrn. Represented the State of Missouri, First Chair. December 16, 2008. Defendant was convicted of Domestic Assault in the First Degree after a bench trial. Defendant was accused of assaulting his girlfriend, causing her to have reduced vision in one eye.

State of Missouri v. Vernon L. Young, 0616-CR07597, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 15, Judge Robert Schieber. Represented the State of Missouri, Second Chair. December 17, 2008. Defendant was convicted of Murder in the Second Degree, Assault in the First Degree, and two counts of Armed Criminal Action after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of killing a teenage boy during a drive-by shooting.

State of Missouri v. Michael D. Calvin, 0716-CR02048, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 10, Judge Charles Atwell. Represented the State of Missouri, Second Chair. Defendant was found not guilty of three counts of Domestic Assault in the Third Degree and Victim Tampering after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of assaulting his girlfriend and then making threatening phone calls to her after his arrest.

State of Missouri v. Carlos E. Saulsberry, 0716-CR05491, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 14, Judge John Torrence. Represented the State of Missouri, First Chair. Defendant was convicted of Violation of an Order of Protection after a bench trial. Defendant was accused of violating a court order to have no contact with his ex-girlfriend less than two hours after the court issued the order of protection.

State of Missouri v. Tiffany M. Coleman, 0616-CR06540, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 15, Judge Robert Schieber. Represented the State of Missouri, First Chair. Defendant was convicted of Assault in the Third Degree after a bench trial. Defendant was accused of throwing a cup of bleach into the face of her sister-in-law.

State of Missouri v. George W. Browning, 0616-CR04348, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 6, Judge John O'Malley. Represented the State of Missouri, Second Chair. January 30, 2007. Defendant was convicted of Assault in the First Degree after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of stabbing a woman on a street corner.

State of Missouri v. Phillip S. Hudson, 0516-CR04187, Sixteenth Judicial Circuit Court Division 10, Judge Charles Atwell. Represented the State of Missouri, First Chair. October 30, 2006. Defendant was convicted of Unlawful Use of a Weapon (Drive-by Shooting) and Tampering in the First Degree after a jury trial. Defendant was accused of firing a gun at a police officer during a traffic stop.

Jones challenged the sentence imposed following a plea of guilty to a controlled substance offense. Submitted on the briefs. Affirmed. November 6, 2012.

United States of America v. Jason Lee Harris, 11-3839, United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit. Represented the United States of America. Harris challenged the sentence imposed during a resentencing hearing following his conviction for being a Felon in Possession of a Firearm. Submitted on the briefs. Affirmed. May 3, 2012.

United States of America v. Jason Lee Harris, 11-1763, United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit. Represented the United States of America. Harris challenged the sufficiency of the evidence supporting his conviction. Submitted on the briefs. Affirmed remanded for resentencing. October 28, 2011.

State of Missouri v. Jose Banuelos-Artega, WD71425, Missouri Court of Appeals for the Western District. Represented the Jackson County Prosecutor's Office. Appellant challenged the trial court's denial of his motion for reimbursement of attorney's fees by the Jackson County Prosecutor's Office, or in the alternative the State of Missouri, following an acquittal in a murder case. I successfully argued that the Prosecutor's Office was not liable for reimbursement, and the matter was remanded to the trial court for an evidentiary hearing on the liability of the State of Missouri. Case remanded following oral argument. March 31, 2010.

Ex. rel Michael Sanders v. Honorable Sandra Midkiff, WD66850, Missouri Court of Appeals for the Western District. Represented then Jackson County Prosecuting Attorney Michael Sanders. 20. Do you now or have you ever held any elective or appointive public office or position? If so, please explain.

Kansas City Commission on Violent Crime, 2011 to present - In 2011, Kansas City Mayor Sylvester James appointed me to serve on the Kansas City Commission on

Violent Crime. The Commission has been asked to review the City's current policies for crime prevention and suggest new initiatives to reduce violent crime. The Commission consists of various community and civic leaders, who all serve in a voluntary capacity, as well as members of law enforcement.

Kansas City Municipal Officials Ethics Commission, 2010 to present - In 2010, Kansas City Mayor Mark Funkhouser appointed me to sit on the seven-member Kansas City Municipal Officials Ethics Commission. In 2012, Kansas City Mayor Sylvester James re-appointed me to the Commission. The Commission reviews candidate financial disclosure reports as well as investigates ethical complaints against city officials. The Commission is comprised of a chairperson and six citizen members who represent each of the voting districts in Kansas City. I serve as the volunteer representative for the citizens of Kansas City's 5th Council District.

In addition to serving on the two appointed commissions described in Question 20, I have been involved with the following community and volunteer activities:

Kansas City Metropolitan Bar Association, Ross T. Roberts Trial Academy. I volunteer as a Master in the Ross T. Roberts Trial Academy (formerly the Ross T. Roberts Inn of Court.) This nine-month long program is designed to improve the trial skills, ethics, and professionalism of practicing attorneys through classroom instruction and mock trial performances. As a Master I critique mock trial performances and provide practical real word advice to attorneys that are seeking to improve their advocacy skills within the courtroom.

Kansas City Youth Court, Member of the Board of Directors. Youth Court is a diversion program for juvenile offenders where they appear with a lawyer before a judge to dispose of their offenses. All of the lawyers and judges in Youth Court are high school students. I work with the students to prepare them for their hearings as well as conduct a class on the basics of criminal law as a part of their training to become Youth Court lawyers.
